#### Book Review

The following books have been selected by Sue Roth for our book review next spring:

<u>A Call to Action: Women, Religion, Violence, and Power</u> by Jimmy Carter "The world's discrimination and violence against women and girls is the most serious, pervasive, and ignored violation of basic human rights: This is President Jimmy

Carter's call to action. President Carter was encouraged to write this book by a wide coalition of leaders of all faiths. His urgent report covers a system of discrimination that extends to every nation. Women are deprived of equal opportunity in wealthier nations and "owned" by men in others, forced to suffer servitude, child marriage, and genital cutting. The most vulnerable, along with their children, are trapped in war and violence. A Call to Action addresses the suffering inflicted upon women by a false interpretation of carefully selected religious texts and a growing tolerance of violence and warfare."

The second book, <u>The Orphan Train</u> by Christina Baker Kline, is a novel about the so-called orphan trains that ran from the cities of the east coast to the farmlands of the Midwest between 1854 and1929, based on fact. Penobscot Indian Molly Ayer is close to "aging out" out of the foster care system. A community service position helping an elderly woman clean out her home is the only thing keeping Molly out of juvie and worse...As she helps Vivian sort through her possessions and memories; Molly learns that she and Vivian aren't as different as they seem to be. A young Irish immigrant orphaned in New York City, Vivian was put on a train to the Midwest with hundreds of other children whose destinies would be determined by luck and chance. Molly discovers that she has the power to help Vivian find answers to mysteries that have haunted her for her entire life – answers that will ultimately free them both.

Women do not have to stand by and be diminished in any way because they lack financial support. At the Nov. meeting we will vote on the Board's recommendation to donate \$5 per member to the AAUW - LAF.
